Back to School Safety Reminders

SPEED LIMIT Ensuring the safety of the children on 25 the roads in our community as they CHILDREN head back to school is essential. Here are some tips for both drivers and parents:

Drivers:

- 1. Slow down: Always reduce your speed in school zones and residential areas. Children are unpredictable, and slower speeds give you more time to react.
- 2. Obey Traffic Laws: Follow all traffic signals and signs, especially those indicating school zones and pedestrian crossings.
- 3. Stop for School Buses: It's illegal to pass a stopped school bus that is loading or unloading children. Always stop when the bus's red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended.
- 4. **Be Alert**: Children's Safety is in Your Hands. **Avoid Distractions!**
- 5. Yield to Pedestrians: Always stop for pedestrians at crosswalks and intersections.

Parents and Students

- 1. Plan Safe Routes: Choose routes with sidewalks and minimal street crossings. Teach your child to use crosswalks and obey traffic signals.
- 2. Walking Groups: Encourage your child to walk with friends or in groups. There's safety in numbers, which can be more fun for them.
- 3. Bicycle Safety: If your child bikes to school, ensure they wear a helmet and follow traffic rules. Teach them to ride in the same direction as traffic and use bike lanes when available.
- 4. Bus Safety: Teach your child to stay at least ten feet away from the curb while waiting for the bus and to wait for the bus driver's signal before boarding.

Leash Requirements and What to Do if Attacked by A Dog Off Leash

Scott Lake is a private park, and dogs must be on a leash while in the park.

If another dog attacks you or your dog, here are the steps you should take:

- 1. Ensure Safety: Try to separate the dogs safely. Use a barrier or loud noise to distract the attacking dog.
- 2. Seek Medical Attention: If you or your dog are injured, seek immediate medical or veterinary care.
- 3. Report the Incident: Contact Thurston County Animal Services at (360)352-2510, Thurston County Non-Emergency Number (360)704-2740, or, if urgent, call 911.
- 4. **Document the Incident**: Take Photos of injuries and gather witnesses.
- 5. Identify the Dog and Owner: If possible, get the contact information of the dog's owner.

Having issues with Rats

Preventing rats from entering your home involves a combination of cleanliness, sealing entry points, and using natural repellents. Here are some effective strategies:

- **1. Seal Entry Points** —Inspect your home for gaps or holes in walls, floors, and foundations. Rats can squeeze through very small openings. Seal cracks and holes with steel wool, caulk, or metal mesh.
- **2. Maintain Cleanliness -** Store food in airtight containers and immediately clean up crumbs and spills. Dispose of garbage regularly and use bins with tight-fitting lids.
- **3. Natural Repellents** —Peppermint oil: Soak cotton balls in peppermint oil and place them in areas where you've noticed rat activity. Same with Eucalyptus oil.
