The winners of the Battle of the Lights are here!


The events committee had difficulty judging this year because we were impressed with the neighborhood's decorations.


Our second choice was also hard to photograph, but we were captivated by its crisp lines and humorous elements.

Prepping for Winter Weather

With winter's arrival, the outside temperatures can be challenging for everyone. Preparation can take that chill out of winter and keep you comfortable.



Here are a few ideas on how to prepare:

- Dress in layers for warmth before going outside. For icy conditions, wear a heavy coat and shoes with good traction. Warm wool socks, a hat, gloves, and a scarf help retain body heat.
- Winter weather can lead to power outages, leaving some people without electricity for days. It's important to prepare an emergency kit that includes a working flashlight, glow-in-the-dark light sticks, a wind-up clock, a portable radio, extra batteries, a manual can opener, and a supply of blankets. Prolonged outages can spoil food in your refrigerator or freezer, so it's wise to stock up on non-perishable foods that can be eaten cold and a backup water supply. If you have pets, remember to stock up on food for them too.
- When winterizing your home, check the gaps around the window frames and doors to ensure cold air does not leak inside. Weatherstripping is a helpful way to help windows close more tightly. Another idea is to purchase plastic sheet insulation, which can be installed in minutes over windows and often tightened with a blow dryer. Remember to use ice melt around your walkways to prevent falls.
- To prevent frozen pipes, let a small amount of cold water trickle from your faucet. This will help keep water moving in your pipes. Additionally, open the under-sink cabinet doors to allow warm air to circulate. It's also a good idea to purchase outdoor faucet covers to protect the spigot from bursting and to prevent pipes from freezing or shattering.
- Check with your pharmacy about a plan to avoid running out of important medication.
