Public Service Announcement from West Thurston Fire

Be Wildfire Ready: Protect Your Home and Community

Wildfire risk is on the rise. The **West Thurston Regional Fire Authority** urges all residents to take action now to protect their home, family, and neighborhood before a wildfire starts.

Mhat You Can Do Today:

1. Create Defensible Space

Reduce flammable material around your home:

- Clear leaves, pine needles, and debris from roofs, gutters, decks, and yards.
- Keep a 5-foot fire-free zone around your house with rock, gravel, or green lawn.
- Prune tree branches at least 10 feet away from your roof and other trees.

2. Harden Your Home

- Install ember-resistant vents and screen attic openings.
- Seal gaps around doors, windows, and siding where embers can enter.
- Use non-combustible roofing and siding materials when possible.

3. Have an Emergency Plan

- Identify at least two evacuation routes from your area.
- Prepare a go-kit with essentials like water, medication, documents, masks, and phone chargers.
- Go-kit for pets and include pets in the evacuation plan.
- Practice evacuation plans with your family.

4. Work With Your Community

- Join or start a Firewise USA® group in your neighborhood.
- Coordinate brush clearing in shared areas like driveways, ditches, and trails.
- Support vulnerable neighbors who may need help evacuating.

5. Stay Alert

- Sign up for Thurston Community Alert System: https://www.co.thurston.wa.us/em
- Check fire danger levels and burn bans at https://www.dnr.wa.gov/wildfires
- Wildfire season is here. Act now to prepare. It could save lives.
